Abstract

The talk will introduce ideas of Japanese contemporary critics Imafuku Ryuta and Ukai Satoshi highlighting a postcolonial sensibility in their conceptualization of Japan through the images of "archipelago" and "wound". Such vision of Japan has its roots in the Yaponeshia (Japanesia) theory of author Shimao Toshio, while at the same time it alludes to literary and critical production from the Caribbean and the Pacific. The intersections of the island/archipelago imagery from Japan and from other regions highlight important concerns related to perceptions of trauma embedded in the sense of ethnic identity and to questions of territory and sovereignty. Examples of postwar and contemporary Japanese literature (from Oba Minako to Shimada Masahiko) can illustrate the potential for historical and cultural critique as manifested in their authors' renderings of remote islands simultaneously as Japan's margins and as metaphors for Japan.
