HKPFS:

- Initial application to RGC
 - By 12 noon, 1 December 2025 (HK time)
- Full application to CUHK
 - By 11:59 pm, 1 December 2025 (HK time)

Main Round:

- 1 December 2025
- For selection panel's full consideration, early applications by the main round deadline are strongly encouraged.

Clearing Round:

31 March 2026
 (Applications in Clearing Round will only be considered subject to availability of places.)



Basic Requirements

- A Bachelor's degree from a recognized university (second honor or above) or a Master's degree
- English proficiency
- Online Application form
- Recommendation letters
 (3 for PhD/ 2 for MPhil)



Department's Requirements

- Research proposal in English
 - 5 pages (excluding the reference list/appendices)
 - Research topic, research summary, previous research regarding the topic, methodology employed, references
- Up to two academic writing sample(s) in English/Chinese/Japanese (if any)
- Japanese proficiency (depends on your proposed research)
- Interview for shortlisted candidates in early-mid December 2025/ April 2026 (Clearing round interview selection in April 2026 may not be held if quotas have already been filled)



Scholarship and Financial Assistance

Postgraduate Studentships

- For full-time research postgraduate students
- Annual studentship for 2025-26 is HK\$229,200 (approx. US\$29,400)
- Payable throughout the normative study period

Award, Scholarship & Funding Support

- The CUHK Reaching Out Award
- Research Postgraduate Student Grants for Overseas Academic Activities (Graduate School & Department)
- Scholarship opportunities from the Department, Faculty of Arts and CUHK

Hong Kong PhD Fellowship Scheme (HKPFS)



Stipend

HK\$340,800 (approx. US\$43,700) per year Up to HK\$1.36 Million (approx. US\$174,770)*




Conference and Research-related Travel Allowance

HK\$14,200 (approx. US\$1,820) per year and HK\$30,000 (approx. US\$3,840) RPg Student Grant for Overseas Academic Activities Up to HK\$86,800 (approx. US\$11,130)*

Enhanced HKPFS Package at CUHK





PhD candidates nominated by CUHK for HKPFS but not selected by RGC will receive admission to our regular PhD programme with postgraduate studentship. These candidates are qualified for the **CUHK Vice-Chancellor's PhD Scholarship of HK\$80,000** (disbursed in three instalments), subject to satisfactory academic performance.

Tuition Waiver Scheme

- Starting from the 2018-19 academic year
- For <u>Local Full-Time</u> RPg students enrolled in UGCfunded RPg programmes
- For entire normative study period

Our research postgraduate programmes consist of coursework and research components. Students need to submit a written research thesis and pass an oral examination for graduation.

Research Proposal Writing Tips

Purpose of a Research Proposal

- To indicate what you would like to study in graduate school
- To write in enough detail to convince the faculty that you understand the scope of research in their discipline, and are engaged with current research themes

How to Frame your Proposal

- Indicate the area of your interests
- Ideally, pose a question, define a problem, or indicate a theme that you would like to address
- Include questions that arise from contemporary research
- Be concise in your writing

Key Components

- 1. Research topic
- 2. Research Summary and Questions
- 3. Literature Review: Existing research and gaps
- 4. Methodology
- 5. References

No more than 5 pages in English (excluding the reference list/ appendices)

Concluding Paragraph

- Why pursue postgraduate studies at CUHK?
- Why the Department of Japanese Studies?
- Look on the web for information about the department, including professors and their research. Are there professors whose research interests parallel yours? If so, indicate this. It is also recommended to end your proposal in a positive manner, indicating your excitement and readiness for the challenges ahead of you.
